Michelle Guelker, Public Works Director gave a brief summary of the following:

Emergency Preparedness

- Installed heat trace and wrapped all wells and exposed piping at each well site.
- Anti-gelling agent has been added to diesel in generators and other emergency equipment.
- All generators, on site and portable, have been inspected and are run on a weekly basis.
- Purchased additional load of sand and have salt remaining from last year to put on roads during icy conditions.
- Generators on order for locations deemed critical that do not currently have onsite generators.

Water Line Replacement

- Working with Derek Turner to develop a water line replacement program and identify areas most in need.
- Small sections of Willow Park where the line may be undersized or in general, needs replacement due to age.
- Project cost of \$100,000 to \$150,000.
- Currently area of focus is streets south of City Hall to the North Service Road and Willow Springs and Willow Springs Oak area.

Water Meters and Customer Portal

- All residential and most of smaller commercial meters have been installed.
- Plan is in place to change out the larger meters during the next year and as meters become available.
- Customer Portal is set to go live January 4.

Each year, prior to March 1, the Chief Administrator of a law enforcement agency is required to submit a written report to the governing body and the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement. The following document is a compilation and analysis of data regarding motor vehicle stops as required by the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure. The data in this report has been reviewed and analyzed, and the Willow Park Police Department is in compliance with all applicable State requirements.

This report meets all requirements as outlined in the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure. The Willow Park Police Department's annual Racial Profiling Report has also been submitted to and accepted by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement.

In addition, the law enforcement agency is required to have a written policy that prohibits racial profiling. The Willow Park Police Department policy is also included and meets the requirements of the State of Texas and the Texas Police Chiefs Association Best Practices.

Article 2.131-2.132

- Prohibits racial profiling by police officers
- · Requires implementation of a process by which complaints may be made for racial profiling
- Requires collection of data related to motor vehicle stops resulting in citations and/or arrests:
 - Race of the individual
 - Whether a search was conducted
 - Whether the search was consensual
 - o Whether the officer knew the race of the individual being stopped prior to the stop
 - Whether the peace officer used physical force that resulted in bodily injury
- Requires the Chief of Police to submit an annual report to the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement (TCOLE) and the Willow Park City Council

Art. 2.131. Racial Profiling Prohibited.

A peace officer may not engage in racial profiling.

Added by Acts 2001, 77th Leg., Ch. 947, Sec. 1, eff. Sept. 1, 2001.

Art. 2.132. LAW ENFORCEMENT POLICY ON RACIAL PROFILING.

- (a) In this article:
 - (1) "Law enforcement agency" means an agency of the state, or of a county, municipality, or other political subdivision of the state, that employs peace officers who make motor vehicle stops in the routine performance of the officers' official duties.
 - (2) "Motor vehicle stop" means an occasion in which a peace officer stops a motor vehicle for an alleged violation of a law or ordinance.
 - (3) "Race or ethnicity" means of a particular descent, including Alaska native or American Indian, Asian or Pacific Islander, black, white, and Hispanic or Latino.
- (b) Each law enforcement agency in this state shall adopt a detailed written policy on racial profiling. The policy must:
 - (1) clearly define acts constituting racial profiling;
 - (2) strictly prohibit peace officers employed by the agency from engaging in racial profiling;
 - (3) implement a process by which an individual may file a complaint with the agency if the individual believes that a peace officer employed by the agency has engaged in racial profiling with respect to the individual;
 - (4) provide public education relating to the agency's compliment and complaint process, including providing the telephone number, mailing address, and e-mail address to make a compliment or complaint with respect to each ticket, citation, or warning issued by a peace officer;
 - (5) require appropriate corrective action to be taken against a peace officer employed by the agency who, after an investigation, is shown to have engaged in racial profiling in violation of the agency's policy adopted under this article;
 - (6) require collection of information relating to motor vehicle stops in which a ticket, citation, or warning is issued and to arrests made as a result of those stops, including information relating to:
 - (A) the race or ethnicity of the individual detained;

- (B) whether a search was conducted and, if so, whether the individual detained consented to the search; and
- (C) whether the peace officer knew the race or ethnicity of the individual detained before detaining that individual;
- (D) whether the peace officer used physical force that resulted in bodily injury, as that term is defined by section 1.07 Penal Code, during the stop;
- (E) the location of the stop; and
- (F) the reason for the stop; and
- (7) require the chief administrator of the agency, regardless of whether the administrator is elected, employed, or appointed, to submit an annual report of the information collected under Subdivision (6) to:
 - (A) the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement; and
 - (B) the governing body of each county or municipality served by the agency, if the agency is an agency of a county, municipality, or other political subdivision of the state.
- (c) The data collected as a result of the reporting requirements of this article shall not constitute prima facie evidence of racial profiling.
- (d) On adoption of a policy under Subsection (b), a law enforcement agency shall examine the feasibility of installing video camera and transmitter-activated equipment in each agency law enforcement motor vehicle regularly used to make motor vehicle stops and transmitter-activated equipment in each agency law enforcement motorcycle regularly used to make motor vehicle stops. The agency shall also examine the feasibility of equipping each peace officer who regularly detains or stops motor vehicles with a body worn camera, as that term is defined by section 1701.651, Occupation Code. If a law enforcement agency installs video or audio equipment as provided by this subsection, the policy adopted by the agency under Subsection (b) must include standards for reviewing video and audio documentation.
- (e) A report required under Subsection (b)(7) may not include identifying information about a peace officer who makes a motor vehicle stop or about an individual who is stopped or arrested by a peace officer. This subsection does not affect the collection of information as required by a policy under Subsection (b)(6).
- (f) On the commencement of an investigation by a law enforcement agency of a complaint described by Subsection (b)(3) in which a video or audio recording of the occurrence on which the complaint is based was made, the agency shall promptly provide a copy of the recording to the peace officer who is the subject of the complaint on written request by the officer.
- (g) On a finding by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement that the chief administrator of a law enforcement agency intentionally failed to submit a report required under Subsection (b)(7), the commission shall begin disciplinary procedures against the chief administrator.

(H) a law enforcement agency shall review the data collected under Subsection (b) (6) to identify any improvements the agency could make in its practices and policies regarding motor vehicle stops.

Art. 2.133. Reports Required for Motor Vehicle Stops

- (a) In this article, "race or ethnicity" has the meaning assigned by Article 2.132(a).
- (b) A peace officer who stops a motor vehicle for an alleged violation of a law or ordinance shall report to the law enforcement agency that employs the officer information relating to the stop, including:
 - (1) a physical description of any person operating the motor vehicle who is detained as a result of the stop, including:
 - (A) the person's gender; and
 - (B) the person's race or ethnicity, as stated by the person or, if the person does not state the person's race or ethnicity, as determined by the officer to the best of the officer's ability;
 - (2) the initial reason for the stop;
 - (3) whether the officer conducted a search as a result of the stop and, if so, whether the person detained consented to the search;
 - (4) whether any contraband or other evidence was discovered in the course of the search and a description of the contraband or evidence;
 - (5) the reason for the search, including whether:
 - (A) any contraband or other evidence was in plain view;
 - (B) any probable cause or reasonable suspicion existed to perform the search; or
 - (C) the search was performed as a result of the towing of the motor vehicle or the arrest of any person in the motor vehicle;
 - (6) whether the officer made an arrest as a result of the stop or the search, including a statement of whether the arrest was based on a violation of the Penal Code, a violation of a traffic law or ordinance, or an outstanding warrant and a statement of the offense charged;
 - (7) the street address or approximate location of the stop; and
 - (8) whether the officer issued a verbal or written warning or a ticket or a citation as a result of the stop; and
 - (9) whether the officer used physical force that resulted in bodily injury, as that term is defined by section 1.07 Penal Code, during the stop;

(c) The chief administrator of a law enforcement agency, regardless of whether the administrator is elected, employed, or appointed, is responsible for auditing reports under Subsection (b) to ensure that the race or ethnicity of the person operating the motor vehicle is being reported.

Art. 2.134. Compilation and Analysis of Information Collected.

- (a) In this article:
 - (1) "Motor vehicle stop" has the meaning assigned by Article 2.132(a).
 - (2) "Race or ethnicity" has the meaning assigned by Article 2.132(a).
- (b) A law enforcement agency shall compile and analyze the information contained in each report received by the agency under Article 2.133. Not later than March 1 of each year, each law enforcement agency shall submit a report containing the incident-based data compiled during the previous calendar year to the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement and, if the law enforcement agency is a local law enforcement agency, to the governing body of each county or municipality served by the agency.
- (c) A report required under Subsection (b) must be submitted by the chief administrator of the law enforcement agency, regardless of whether the administrator is elected, employed, or appointed, and must include:
 - (1) a comparative analysis of the information compiled under Article 2.133 to:
 - (A) evaluate and compare the number of motor vehicle stops, within the applicable jurisdiction, of persons who are recognized as racial or ethnic minorities and persons who are not recognized as racial or ethnic minorities; and
 - (B) examine the disposition of motor vehicle stops made by officers employed by the agency, categorized according to the race or ethnicity of the affected persons, as appropriate, including any searches resulting from stops within the applicable jurisdiction; and
 - (C) evaluate and compare the number of searches resulting from motor vehicle stops within the applicable jurisdiction and whether contraband or other evidence was discovered in the course of those searches; and
 - (2) information relating to each complaint filed with the agency alleging that a peace officer employed by the agency has engaged in racial profiling.
- (d) A report required under Subsection (b) may not include identifying information about a peace officer who makes a motor vehicle stop or about an individual who is stopped or arrested by a peace officer. This subsection does not affect the reporting of information required under Article 2.133(b)(1).
- (e) The Texas Commission on Law Enforcement, in accordance with Section 1701.162, Occupations Code, shall develop guidelines for compiling and reporting information as required by this article.
- (f) The data collected as a result of the reporting requirements of this article shall not constitute prima facie evidence of racial profiling.

(g) On a finding by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement that the chief administrator of a law enforcement agency intentionally failed to submit a report required under Subsection (b), the commission shall begin disciplinary procedures against the chief administrator.

I. PURPOSE

A. The purpose of this order is to reaffirm the City of Willow Park Police Department's commitment to unbiased policing in all its encounters with any person; to reinforce procedures that serve to ensure public confidence and mutual trust through the provision of services in a fair and equitable fashion; and to protect our officers from unwarranted accusations of misconduct when they act within the dictates of departmental policy and the law.

II. POLICY

- A. It is the policy of this department to police in a proactive manner and to aggressively investigate suspected violations of the law. Officers shall actively enforce local, state and federal laws in a responsible and professional manner without regard to race, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, religion, economic status, age, cultural group, or any other identifiable group. Officers are strictly prohibited from engaging in racial profiling as defined in this policy. Racial profiling is an unacceptable police tactic and will not be condoned.
- B. This General Order is adopted in compliance with the requirements of Articles 2.131 through 2.136, Texas Code of Criminal Procedure, which prohibits Texas peace officers from engaging in racial profiling.

III. <u>DEFINITIONS</u>

- A. <u>Racial Profiling</u> a law enforcement-initiated action based on an individual's race, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, religion, economic status, age, cultural group, or any other identifiable group rather than on the individual's behavior or on information identifying the individual as having engaged in criminal activity. Racial profiling pertains to persons who are viewed as suspects or potential suspects of criminal behavior. The term is not relevant as it pertains to witnesses, complainants, persons needing assistance, or other citizen contacts.
- B. <u>Race or Ethnicity</u> persons of a particular descent, including Alaska native or American Indian, Asian or Pacific Islander, Black, White, and Hispanic or Latino.
- C. <u>Acts Constituting Racial Profiling</u> acts initiating law enforcement action, such as a traffic stop, a detention, a search, issuance of a citation, or an arrest based solely upon an individual's race, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, religion, economic status, age, cultural group, or any other identifiable group rather than upon the individual's behavior, information identifying the individual as having possibly engaged in criminal activity, or other lawful reasons for the law enforcement action.
- D. <u>Motor Vehicle Stop</u> means an occasion in which a peace officer stops a motor vehicle for an alleged violation of a law or ordinance.

IV. PROHIBITION

A. Officers of the Willow Park Police Department are strictly prohibited from engaging in racial profiling. The prohibition against racial profiling does not preclude the use of race, ethnicity or national origin as factors in a detention decision by an officer. Race, ethnicity or national origin may be legitimate factors in such a decision when used as part of a description of a suspect or witness for whom an officer is searching.

V. COMPLAINT PROCESS

- A. No person shall be discouraged, intimidated or coerced from filing a complaint, or be discriminated against because they have filed a complaint.
- B. Any person who believes that a peace officer employed by the Willow Park Police Department has engaged in racial profiling with respect to that person, may file a complaint in accordance with the provisions of General Order 300, Discipline/Complaints against Police Personnel.
 - 1. An employee who is contacted regarding a complaint against an officer shall follow the procedures set forth in General Order 300, Section X. Investigation of Externally Originated Complaints.
 - 2. Citizens who appear in person wishing to file a complaint shall be provided with a departmental brochure, "How to File a Complaint." Brochures are maintained in the Willow Park Police Department lobby, and at Willow Park City Hall. Citizens may also be directed to the Departmental website to file a complaint.
- C. Any supervisor who becomes aware of an alleged or suspected violation of this General Order shall report the alleged violation in accordance with General Order 300, Discipline, Section XI. Investigation of Internally Originated Complaints.

D. Complaints of racial profiling shall be classified as a Level I complaint and shall be investigated by the Office of the Chief of Police, unless otherwise directed by the Chief of Police. A log of all Racial Profiling Complaints will be maintained by the Office of the Chief of Police.

VI. <u>DISCIPLINARY AND CORRECTIVE ACTIONS</u>

A. Any officer of this Department who is found, after investigation, to have engaged in racial profiling in violation of this General Order may be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including termination. Disciplinary or corrective actions may include diversity, sensitivity or other appropriate training or counseling, as determined by the Chief of Police.

VII. PUBLIC EDUCATION

A. This Department shall provide education to the public concerning the racial profiling complaint process. The primary method of public education shall be through a brochure, "How to File a Complaint" which are maintained in the lobby of the Willow Park Police Department, and at the Willow Park City Hall. These brochures are available in both English and Spanish versions. Other education methods may be utilized to inform the public, including news media, civic presentations, the Internet, and/or public meetings.

VIII. <u>COLLECTION OF INFORMATION AND ANNUAL REPORT WHEN CITATION ISSUED OR</u> ARREST MADE

- A. For each motor vehicle stop in which a citation or warning is issued and for each arrest resulting from a motor vehicle stop, an officer involved in the stop shall collect the following information:
 - 1. Information identifying the gender of the individual detained
 - a. Female
 - b. Male
 - 2. Information identifying the race or ethnicity of the individual detained. The following codes will be used to identify the individual's race:

A = Asian

B = Black

H = Hispanic/Latino

I = Alaska Native/American Indian

W = White

(Note: Officers may not ask the individual to identify their race.)

- 3. Whether the peace officer knew the race or ethnicity of the individual detained before detaining that individual; and
- 4. Reason for the stop
 - a. Violation of law
 - b. Preexisting knowledge

- c. Moving traffic violation
- d. Vehicle traffic violation
- 5. Street Address or approximate location of the stop
 - a. City Street
 - b. U.S. Highway
 - c. County Road
 - d. State Highway
 - e. Private Property or other
- 6. Was a search conducted?
- 7. Reason for the search
 - a. Consent
 - b. Contraband in plain view
 - c. Probable cause
 - d. Inventory
 - e. Incident to arrest
- 8. Was contraband discovered?
 - a. Yes
 - b. No
- 9. Description of contraband
 - a. Drugs
 - b. Currency
 - c. Weapons
 - d. Alcohol
 - e. Stolen Property
 - f. Other
- 10. Result of the stop
 - a. Verbal warning
 - b. Written warning
 - c. Citation
 - d. Written warning and arrest
 - e. Citation and arrest
 - f. Arrest
- 11. What was the arrest based on?
 - a. Violation of Penal Code
 - b. Violation of Traffic Law
 - c. Violation of City Ordinance
 - d. Outstanding Warrant
- 12. Whether the peace officer used physical force that resulted in bodily injury, as that term is defined by Section 1.07, Penal Code, during the stop; and

- B. The information collected shall be entered in to the Racial Profiling module in the Cardinal ticket writing program by the officer in a timely manner. All stops requiring Racial Profiling data collection must be entered.
- C. The Captain shall ensure all Racial Profiling Data is collected and reported to the Chief of Police. The data collected shall be compiled in an annual report covering the period January 1 through December 31 of each year and shall be submitted to the governing body of the City of Willow Park no later than March 1 of the following year. The report will include:
 - 1. A breakdown of citations by race or ethnicity;
 - 2. Number of citations that resulted in a search;
 - 3. Number of searches that were consensual;
 - 4. Number of citations that resulted in custodial arrest; and
 - 5. Public education efforts concerning the racial profiling complaint process.
- D. The annual report shall not include identifying information about any individual stopped or arrested and shall not include identifying information about any peace officer involved in a stop or arrest.
- E. Racial Profiling Data will also be reported to the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement (TCOLE) by March 1 of each year, following the Commission's prescribed format.

IX. AUDIO AND VIDEO EQUIPMENT

- A. Each motor vehicle regularly used by this department to make motor vehicle stops shall be equipped with a mobile video camera system capable of recording video and audio, and each motorcycle regularly used by this department to make motor vehicle stops shall be equipped with audio recording equipment.
- B. Each motor vehicle stop made by an officer of this department capable of being recorded by video and audio, or by audio only for motorcycles, shall be recorded.
- C. Supervisors and Officers shall ensure that mobile video camera equipment, and/or audio equipment, is properly functioning prior to commencing their tour of duty. Police units with malfunctioning or inoperable mobile video camera equipment shall not be utilized under normal circumstances.
- D. Supervisors shall have the authority to assign units with malfunctioning or inoperable mobile video equipment when situations dictate. Officers assigned to such units shall collect and document the information listed below for each motor vehicle stop. All documentation must be submitted to the officer's supervisor prior to ending that tour of duty. Documentation shall include but is not limited to Field Interview Forms, Traffic Citations and Warning Tickets.
 - 1. A physical description of any person operating the motor vehicle, who is detained as a result of the stop, including:

- a. the person's gender; and
- b. the person's race or ethnicity, as stated by the person, or if the person does not state, the person's race or ethnicity, as determined by the officer to the best of his or her ability. Officers will not ask the individual to identify their race or ethnicity;
- 2. Whether the officer knew the race or ethnicity of the individual detained before detaining that individual;
- 3. The initial reason for the stop;
- 4. Whether the officer conducted a search as a result of the stop, and, if so, whether or not the person detained consented to the search;
- 5. Whether any contraband or other evidence was discovered in the course of the search and a description of the contraband or evidence;
- 6. The reason for the search, including whether:
 - a. Any contraband or other evidence was in plain view;
 - b. Any probable cause or reasonable suspicion existed to perform the search; or
 - c. The search was performed as a result of the towing of the motor vehicle or the arrest of any person in the motor vehicle
- 7. Whether the officer made an arrest as a result of the stop or the search, including a statement of whether the arrest was based on a violation of Penal Code, a violation of traffic law or ordinance or an outstanding warrant and a statement of the offense charged.
- 8. The street address or approximate location of the stop;
- 9. Whether the officer issued a citation or a written warning as a result of the stop; and
- 10. Whether the person contacted is a resident or non-resident of the City of Willow Park. This shall be reflected on each citation issued, using an (R) for residents or an (NR) for non-resident.

X. REVIEW OF VIDEO AND AUDIO DOCUMENTATION

- A. Each audio and video recording shall be retained for a minimum period of one hundred-twenty (120) days, unless a complaint is filed alleging that an officer has engaged in racial profiling with respect to a motor vehicle stop. The Captain shall ensure that all audio and video recordings are properly stored and retained in accordance with applicable laws and this General Order.
- B. If a complaint is received alleging that an officer has engaged in racial profiling, the audio / video recording shall be forwarded to the Office of the Chief of Police who shall retain the video until final disposition of the complaint has been made.

- C. The Captain or his designee shall review a randomly selected sampling of at least three video and audio recordings, made recently by officers employed by the Department, in order to determine if patterns of racial profiling exist. These reviews shall be conducted monthly and documented on the appropriate form (WPPD-013).
 - 1. Written documentation shall include:
 - a. the names of the officers whose stops were reviewed;
 - b. the date(s) of the videos reviewed;
 - c. the date the actual review was conducted; and
 - d. the name of the person conducting the review.
 - 2. The Captain shall forward the required documentation to the Office of the Chief of Police.
 - 3. The Captain shall maintain a file of all video review documentation performed, in compliance with this General Order.
- D. In reviewing audio and video recordings, the Captain or his designee, shall seek to determine if the officer(s) reviewed have engaged in a pattern of racial profiling, that includes multiple acts constituting racial profiling for which there is no reasonable, credible explanation based on established police and law enforcement procedures.

XI. TRAINING

A. Each peace officer employed by the department shall complete the comprehensive education and training program on racial profiling established by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement (TCOLE) not later than the second anniversary of the date the officer was licensed, or the date the officer applies for an intermediate proficiency certificate, whichever date is earlier. A person who on September 1, 2001, held a TCOLE intermediate proficiency certificate, or who had held a peace officer license issued by TCOLE for at least two years, shall complete a TCOLE training and education program on racial profiling not later than September 1, 2003.

The Chief of Police shall, in completing the training required by Section 96.641, Texas Education Code, complete the program on racial profiling established by the Bill Blackwood Law Enforcement Management Institute of Texas (LEMIT), not later than September 1, 2003.

XII. <u>EFFECTIVE DATE</u>

- A. Any previous directive, rule, order or regulation that pertains to this subject matter and its amendments shall remain in full force and effect for any violation(s) which occur prior to the effective date of this General Order.
- B. If any section, sentence, clause or phrase of this General Order is, for any reason, held to be invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this General Order.
- C. All training on this General Order will be in accordance with General Order 100, Written Directive System, Chapter VIII, Training.

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The effective date is stated in the header block of this General Order.






Traffic Related contacts Resulting in Search, Arrest, or Citation




Total Searches from Traffic Related Contacts

- 5) requires appropriate corrective action to be taken against a peace officer employed by the WILLOW PARK POLICE DEPT. who, after an investigation, is shown to have engaged in racial profiling in violation of the WILLOW PARK POLICE DEPT. policy;
- 6) requires collection of information relating to motor vehicle stops in which a warning or citation is issued and to arrests made as a result of those stops, including information relating to:
 - a. the race or ethnicity of the individual detained;
 - b. whether a search was conducted and, if so, whether the individual detained consented to the search;
 - c. whether the peace officer knew the race or ethnicity of the individual detained before detaining that individual;
 - d. whether the peace officer used physical force that resulted in bodily injury during the stop;
 - e. the location of the stop;
 - f. the reason for the stop.
- 7) requires the chief administrator of the agency, regardless of whether the administrator is elected, employed, or appointed, to submit an annual report of the information collected under Subdivision (6) to:
 - a. the Commission on Law Enforcement; and
 - b. the governing body of each county or municipality served by the agency, if the agency is an agency of a county, municipality, or other political subdivision of the state.

The WILLOW PARK POLICE DEPT. has satisfied the statutory data audit requirements as prescribed in Article 2.133(c), Code of Criminal Procedure during the reporting period.

-COMPARISON STUDY ON FOUR PARKER COUNTY CITIES -

The attached study provides a monthly view of the number of cases filed, dispositions made, and money collected for the four major cities in Parker County for calendar year 2021. The information contained was collected from the Office of Court Administration website.

Items of note include the low number of cases filed across all cities; a trend that has been documented nationally.

You'll also notice the number of City of Willow Park cases increased greatly during the last three months of the calendar year 2021, which also represents the first quarter of FY2022. * SEE NOTE BELOW

The number of cases disposed reflects closed cases but does not consider cases placed on payment arrangements, driving safety, deferred disposition, or continuances. Therefore, this line item is not a reflection of the number of cases actually processed.

Based on the money collected being the lowest for the three cities – Weatherford, Willow Park and Springtown – a comparison study has also been conducted on the standing 'window' fine amounts and our base fines were increased to match those of the City of Weatherford and became effective Jan 19, 2022.

*Identification of the number of cases filed is not in any respect to be construed that the court is commenting on the activities of the Police Department. Though there is a direct correlation between the cases filed and the cases processed by the court, per Transportation code 702.002 it is outside of our jurisdiction and both unethical and illegal to influence the Police Department in any way in respect to the number of cases filed. This report is simply identifying the case load of the court as it compares on a monthly basis and with the rest of Parker County.

AGENDA ITEM:

Discussion/Action: The city Council may consider, discuss and take action on a resolution creating the Capital Improvements Advisory Committee and appointing its members and establishing and adopting procedural rules for, and duties associated with, the Committee in accordance with Chapter 395 of the Texas Local Government Code.

BACKGROUND:

Council shall appoint an advisory committee on or before the date on which the order, ordinance or resolution is adopted under LGC 395.042 establishing a public hearing date to consider land use assumptions and capital improvements plan for the designated service area. See LGC 395.058(a). The primary purpose of the advisory committee is to advise and assist in the preparation of the land use assumptions and the capital improvements plan. The advisory committee also has the ongoing responsibility to produce semi-annual reports and assist in the updating of the impact plan. The advisory committee shall be composed of not less than five (5) members who shall be appointed by the City Council. Membership criteria for the advis01y committee is as follows:

- a) Not less than 40 percent of the membership must be representatives of the real estate, development, or building industries.
- b) The Planning and Zoning Commission may act as the advisory committee if the Commission includes at least one representative of the real estate, development or building industries who is not an employee or official of the City. If P&Z does not contain such a representative, P&Z may still act as the advisory committee if at least one such representative is appointed by the City as an ad hoc voting member of the P&Z when it acts as the advisory committee. If an impact fee is to be established in the etj of the City, the membership must include a representative from that area.

The City Council shall adopt procedural rules for the advisory committee to follow in carrying out its duties. 395.058(e) LGC.

STAFF/BOARD/COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends the City Council appoint the current Planning and Zoning Commission and add Randy L Pack as the ETJ representative to serve as the Capital Improvements Advisory Committee.

RESOLUTION	
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A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF WILLOW PARK, TEXAS, CREATING THE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE AND APPOINTING ITS MEMBERS, ESTABLISHING AND ADOPTING THE PROCEDURAL RULES FOR AND DUTIES ASSOCIATED THEREWITH IN ACCORDANCE WITH CHAPTER 395 OF THE TEXAS LOCAL GOVERNMENT CODE REGARDING WATER AND WASTEWATER IMPACT FEES; MAKING VARIOUS FINDINGS AND PROVISIONS RELATED TO THE SUBJECT OF WATER AND WASTEWATER IMPACT FEES; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, Texas Local Government Code Chapter 395 (the "Impact Fee Statute") authorizes political subdivisions, including the City of Willow Park, Texas ("City"), to enact and impose impact fees on land within their corporate boundaries or extraterritorial jurisdictions to finance capital improvements associated with new development; and

WHEREAS, the Impact Fee Statute prescribes a process and methodology by which the City must conduct public hearings concerning the consideration, approval and updating of the Land Use Assumptions ("LUAs") and Capital Improvement Plan ("CIP"), the adoption or modification of impact fees, and the ongoing periodic review and reporting requirements associated with the impact fees once adopted; and

WHEREAS, the Impact Fee Statute requires the City's governing body (the "City Council") to appoint a Capital Improvement Advisory Committee (the "Committee") to advise the City Council on certain matters related to the impact fee consideration and adoption procedures required by the Impact Fee Statute; and

WHEREAS, the Impact Fee Statute also requires the City Council to adopt procedural rules for the Committee to follow in the execution of its duties; and

WHEREAS, the City Council deems it to be in the public's best interest to create the Capital Improvement Advisory Committee in conjunction with the City's consideration of impact fees to finance capital improvements for water and wastewater facilities associated with new development in the City.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WILLOW PARK, TEXAS:

Section 1. Findings.

The findings and recitations set out in the preamble to this Resolution are found to be true and correct and are hereby adopted by the City Council and made a part hereof for all purposes.

Section 2. Capital Improvement Advisory Committee

The City Council hereby establishes the Capital Improvement Advisory Committee as follows:

- a. *Establishment*. The City of Willow Park Capital Improvement Advisory Committee ("Committee") is an advisory board whose purpose shall be to advise and make recommendations to the City Council regarding the study, consideration, development, adoption and/or modification of impact fees pursuant to the Impact Fee Statute.
- b. Membership, Compliance & Appointment.
 - i. The City Council hereby appoints the City's Planning and Zoning Commission to serve as the Committee, to wit: Jared Fowler, Rodney Wilkins, Joe Lane, Billy Weikert, Sharon Brutron, and Scott Smith. The City Council also hereby appoints the following person to the Committee who resides in the extraterritorial jurisdiction of the City since the impact fees apply to the extraterritorial jurisdiction: Randy L. Pack.
 - ii. The City Council finds that one member of the City's Planning and Zoning Commission is from the real estate, development or building industry and further finds that this member is not either an employee or official who serves a political subdivision or governmental entity.
 - iii. The City Council reserves the right to appoint additional members to the Committee if required to replace a member due to a resignation or for any other purpose as may be required to comply with the Impact Fee Statute.
- c. Committee Functions and Duties.
 - i. The Committee shall serve in an advisory capacity;
 - ii. The Committee shall advise and assist the City in adopting LUAs;
 - iii. The Committee shall review the CIP and file written comments for the benefit of the City Council;
 - iv. The Committee shall monitor and evaluate the implementation of the CIP;
 - v. The Committee shall file semi-annual reports with

- respect to the progress of the CIP and report to the City Council any inequities, actual or perceived, in implementing the CIP or imposing the impact fees;
- vii. The Committee shall advise the City Council of the need to update or revise the LUAs, CIP, or impact fees; and
- viii. The Committee shall fulfill any other duties or obligations that may be required of it in accordance with the Impact Fee Statute.

d. Committee Conduct.

- i. The Committee shall appoint one member as its Chairperson and one member as its Vice-Chairperson at its first meeting following the approval this Resolution.
- ii. The Chairperson shall preside over all meetings of the Committee and in the absence of the Chairperson, the Vice-Chairperson shall preside.
- iii. The Committee shall appoint a Secretary who shall be responsible for recording the minutes of the Committee's meetings and posting notice of meetings in accordance with City ordinances and state law.
- iv. The Committee shall conduct Committee business only when a quorum of members is present. A quorum is defined as a majority of the membership of the Committee. A majority vote of the quorum shall be required for any action to be taken by the Committee. The Committee shall follow the Texas Open Meetings Act.
- v. The Committee shall meet at sufficient intervals so as to fulfill its functions and duties in a reasonably timely manner.
- vi. The Committee shall meet as directed by the City Council to conduct business.
- vii. The Chairperson or any two (2) Committee members may call a meeting as necessary to conduct business. Meetings shall be held at Willow Park City Hall.
- viii. The Committee shall provide Committee Reports to the City Council that include comments and recommendations regarding the LUAs, CIP and impact fees.
- e. Committee Reports. The Committee shall provide Committee Reports to the City Council that include comments and recommendations regarding the LUA's, CIP and impact fees, which shall be submitted as follows:
 - i. Before the fifth (5th) business day before the date of

- the public hearing on the proposed LUA'S and CIP;
- ii. Before the fifth (5th) business day before the date of the public hearing on the proposed impact fees;
- iii. Before the fifth (5th) business day before the date of the public hearing on any proposed amendments to the LUA's, CIP and impact fees; and
- iv. At any other such time as the Committee or City Council shall deem appropriate or necessary.

Section 3. Supporting Reports and Studies

The City Council and City Staff shall make available to the Committee any professional reports regarding the development or implementation of land use assumptions, capital improvement plans, utility financial analyses, or any other information that may be available and relevant to the study, consideration, development and adoption of impact fees pursuant to the Impact Fee Statute.

Section 4. Severability Clause

In the event any clause, phrase, provision, sentence or part of this Resolution or the application of the same to any person or circumstances shall for any reason be adjudged invalid or held unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, it shall not affect, impair, or invalidate this Resolution as a whole or any part or provision hereof other than the part declared to be invalid or unconstitutional; and the City Council of the City of Willow Park, Texas, declares that it would have passed each and every part of the same notwithstanding the omission of any part thus declared to be invalid or unconstitutional.

Section 5. Effective Date.

This Resolution shall be effective upon its passage and approval by City Council.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 848-22 ORDERING A GENERAL MUNICIPAL ELECTION TO BE HELD ON MAY 7, 2022 FOR THE PURPOSE OF ELECTING, COUNCILMEMBER FOR PLACE NO. 3, A COUNCILMEMBER FOR PLACE NO. 5; DESIGNATING A DIFFERENT POLLING PLACE FOR ELECTION DAY, WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL LIMITS; APPOINTING A PRESIDING ELECTION JUDGE AND ALTERNATE PRESIDING ELECTION JUDGE; ESTABLISHING OTHER PROCEDURES FOR THE CONDUCT OF THE ELECTION; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION OF NOTICE; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, at its January 11, 2022 Council meeting, the City Council passed Ordinance No. _____ (the "Election Ordinance") calling for a general election for certain municipal officer of the City of Will Park, Texas to be held on May 7, 2022, and designating the polling place for election day to be the City of Willow Park City Hall; and

WHEREAS, the polling location for election day must be changed to the First Baptist Willow Park Welcome Center located at 601 Ranch House Road, Willow Park, Texas;

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to amend the Election Ordinance to change the polling place location and to amend the Election Ordinance in its entirety to read as set forth herein;

WHEREAS, a general election for certain municipal officers of the City of Willow Park, Texas is ordered herein for MAY 7, 2022 under the authority of law; and

WHEREAS, Jenise Miller, the Elections Administrator for Parker County, is designated under §83.005 TEX. ELECTION CODE as the Early Voting Clerk for elections ordered on behalf of a municipality; and

WHEREAS, the City will enter into an agreement with Parker County for the provision of election services and said agreement provides for an election judge and the dates on which early voting shall occur; and

NOW THEREFORE: BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WILLOW PARK, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. INCORPORATION

All of the above precatory statements are true and correct and incorporated herein for all purposes.

SECTION 2. DATE OF ELECTION

It is hereby ordered that an election for certain municipal officers shall be held in and throughout the City of ORDINANCE NO. $__$ - 22 Page

Willow Park, Texas on MAY 7, 2022.

SECTION 3. PURPOSE OF ELECTION

The purpose of the election is to provide for the general election of city officers, specifically: Council Members Place No. 3, Place No. 4, and Place No. 5. The term for Council Member Place No. 3, Council Member Place 4, and Councilmember Place No. 5 are for a term of two years, ending May 2024.

SECTION 4. POLLING PLACE

The City of Willow Park polling place for the May 7, 2022 election day shall be the First Baptist Willow Park Welcome Center, 601 Ranch House Road, Willow Park, Texas.

In accordance with §41.03l(b) TEX. ELECTION CODE, said polling place shall be open between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. on the date of election.

SECTION 5. ELECTION JUDGES

The Presiding Election Judge and Alternate Presiding Election Judge shall be as appointed by Parker County pursuant to an agreement with the County.

All Election Judges herein appointed, shall appoint not more than two eligible persons as clerks to serve and assist in the conduct of election. Provided, however, that if the Election Judge named herein actually serves, the Alternate Election Judge shall serve as one of the clerks. All election clerks shall be qualified voters of the City.

SECTION 6. EARLY VOTING CLERK

Jenise Miller, the Elections Administrator for Parker County, is hereby designated as the Early Voting Clerk pursuant to §83.05 TEX. ELECTION CODE for the election ordered herein. The official mailing address of the early voting clerk is 1112 Santa Fe Drive, Weatherford, Texas 76086. The City Secretary is further ordered to procure and allocate the supplies necessary to conduct the election pursuant to §51.003(3) TEX. ELECTION CODE and to provide written notice to the presiding and alternate presiding judge of the election as specified by §32.009 TEX. ELECTION CODE.

SECTION 7. PUBLICATION AND POSTING OF NOTICE

Notice of the City election shall be given by posting a Notice of Election at the City of Willow Park City Hall on the bulletin board or other location used for posting notices of the meetings of the City Council, not later than 21 days prior to the date of the election, and by publication of said notice at least once in the newspaper published in the City, or if none, in a newspaper of general circulation. The date of said publication to be not less than 10 days nor more than 30 days prior to the date set for the election. Upon publication of the election notice, the City Secretary shall secure a Publisher's Affidavit or copy of the notice which complies with the requirements of §4.005 TEX. ELECTION CODE.

SECTION 8. EARLY VOTING

ORDINANCE NO. -22

Early voting by personal appearance shall commence on April 25, 2022 and shall continue Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. until May 3, 2022 at a location to be determined by the City and the Early Voting Clerk. Extended hours for early voting shall be determined by the Early Voting Clerk and the City. A supplemental notice shall be issued stating the early voting location and the dates for the extended hours of early voting. Early voting shall be conducted in accordance with the requirements of the TEX. ELECTIONCODE.

Applications for voting by mail shall be delivered to the Early Voting Clerk at the same address not later than the close-of-business on April 26, 2022.

SECTION 9. NECESSARY ACTIONS

ELECTION CODE in carrying out and conducting the election whetller or not specifically authorized herein.

The City Secretary is directed to send a copy of the executed Order of Election to the Parker County Clerk and Election Administrator on or before March 2, 2022, pursuant to § 4.008 TEX. ELECTION CODE.

SECTION 10. SEVERABILITY

If for any reason any section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid, it shall not affect any valid provisions of this or any other Ordinance of the City of Willow Park to which these rules and regulations relate.

SECTION 11. EFFECTIVE DATE

This Ordinance shall take effect from and after the date of its adoption.





City Engineer Report – Update on Fort Worth water projects

BACKGROUND:

- 1. Fort Worth Willow Park Pipeline progress Mountain Cascade
 - a. Fort Worth water turned on 8/4, turned off mid-October
 - b. SCADA Communication tower finished.
 - c. Remaining work is to pressure test and disinfect the small portion of 16-inch pipeline that is part of the pipeline to Hudson Oaks. To be done once pump station is operational.
- 2. Willow Park-Hudson Oaks pipeline progress Wildstone
 - a. Pipeline is 100% installed
 - b. Remaining items include pipeline testing, clean up, and restoration. Pipeline testing and disinfection to be done once pump station is operational.
- 3. Pump Station project update MELA Contracting, Inc.
 - a. Shop drawing submittals/review continues
 - b. Supply chain issues are occurring all over, and unfortunately MELA has not been immune to these. So, pressure has been mounting on whether MELA can meet the contractual Completion Date of 5/3/22. The Halff Team has been working with MELA to help identify these issues early and assist where we can in mitigating schedule delays. Here is a summary to date:
 - i. Significant delay on delivery of emergency power generator. Resolution Cities to rent a portable generator temporary, to not delay startup.
 - ii. Delay on pump delivery MELA to tightly schedule installation and testing to delay only slightly startup (1 to 2 weeks)
 - iii. Delay on SCADA related parts/programming. MELA has coordinated an expedited schedule with HALFF and SCADA programmers to stay on schedule
 - iv. Valves delayed. MELA is switching to a different manufacturer that can deliver valves on time.
 - C. Suffice to say that given the current global situation, additional delays may pop up. Therefore, the Halff Team has been working with Willow Park staff to ensure there is a backup plan to get through this summer without the pump station, etc. We now plan to keep the temporary meter station and connection in place and useable through the summer. Bryan authorized us to seek an extension of the temporary agreement with Fort Worth. Those negotiations have begun, and it appears it will be possible to utilize the temporary meter station again, if needed. To be confirmed soon. MELA has instructions to hold off on any demolition of the temporary meter station, until further notice.

Fire Department Report

BACKGROUND:

Operations

The operations personnel are the backbone of the department providing the workforce to respond to emergency calls, operate and maintain the department's apparatus, equipment, stations, and fulfill the Department's operational mission.

With the support of the city and the council the operations division grew by three new firefighter positions. The three firefighter positions allowed the department to operate with three fire personnel on each 24-hour shift. The new positions also allowed the department to staff the ladder truck on a consistent basis.

Operations personnel remained busy throughout the year handling the workload of operating and maintaining the department to a high standard. The Department was inspected by the Texas Commission on Fire Protection this year. The department passed the inspection and was commended by state inspectors based on operational personnel maintaining the department to such a high standard.

This year staff responded to 985 calls to service, provided fire prevention education presentations at schools, daycares, and church organizations. The department provided other support functions like providing and installing free smoke detectors for citizens in cooperation with American Red Cross.

Training

1581- Hours of Department level training completed for the year. In addition to the normal training subjects taught on a regular and ongoing basis, the department identified two primary objectives for training this year. The first primary objective was to orient new employees to the operations of the department. The second objective was to provide the training to transition the primary response from an Engine company to a Truck Company responding in a Ladder Truck.

The department was able to orient the new employees to operations with training within the department and Tarrant Count College. Employees travel once a month to Tarrant County College Fire Training Center where they can study, drill, and operate with industry experts on a world class fire training field. This year the department received quality hands on training in the following subjects: Fire Lab with flashover simulator, Rapid Intervention Training, Ladders, Ventilation, Aerial Operations, Rope Rescue drills, Hazardous Materials Technician level CE, Vehicle stabilization and lifting, Standpipe Hose Deployment, Building construction, and Live Fire Scenarios.
