Construction begins on Ben Hogan Learning Center



The First Tee of Fort Worth broke ground on the second Ben Hogan Learning Center at Squaw Creek Golf Course on Wednesday May 13. Once completed, the center will serve youth ages 7-18 in Parker County and far western Tarrant County with The First Tee signature Life Skills Curriculum taught through the game of golf.

“We are honored and excited to build our second Ben Hogan Learning Center at Squaw Creek,” said Kevin Long, Executive Director of The First Tee of Fort Worth. “This facility will allow us to positively impact thousands of young people in Parker County with critical life skills and core values as well as further strengthen our ability to honor the legacy of Mr. Hogan.”

The project is a partnership between The First Tee of Fort Worth, the Ben Hogan Foundation, Corporate Employ-

ees Recreation Association (CERA) and Squaw Creek Golf Course. Funding for the project is being provided by the Ben Hogan Foundation along with many private donors and foundations. A unique feature of the building will be a donor recognition wall covered with the original wood flooring from Ben Hogan’s childhood home in Fort Worth.

Robert Stennett, Chief Executive Officer of the Ben Hogan Foundation, said: “We are proud to support The First Tee because it not only promotes the game of golf, but just as importantly, it exposes children to life skills and The First Tee’s Nine Core Values. These values will help the youth in The First Tee program become better and more productive citizens as they become young adults. We know Mr. Hogan would be proud of what we are doing.”
